Because of numerous thefts corritted on vegetable gardens, also thefts of livestock, Governor Phillip found it necessary to establish this Night Watch, which consisted of 12 convicts. The regulations setting out their duties were dated 7th August, 1789. The men were divided into four parties to patrol the following divisions:—

1) Convict huts and public farm on east side of cove.

- 2) The Brick Kilns and the detached parties at different farms in that district.
- 3) Those on the western side as far as the line that separates the worken from the men.
- 4) The huts from the above line to the hespital and on to the observatory.

The members of the Night Watch ero to make themselves familiar with everyone in their division and to report on any loitering. This applied to the soldiers and seamen as well as the convicts, and any thefts or disdumcanours were to be reported to Herbert Keeling, who was in charge of the Watch.

After the formation of the Night Watch the number of thefts diminished dramatically, but Major Ross was unhoppy that convicts were given the right to detain a soldier, and so the regulations were altered on 9th November, 1789, so that a member was not allowed to detain a soldier unless he was found rioting or committing an unlawful act, in which case he was to be taken to the nearest guard. (Reference: H.R.A. Series 1 Volume 1).
