

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

My wife Sandra and I attended the Canberra Chapter's Annual Dinner. Mrs. Joyce Cowell, Miss Alice Clarke and Miss Ula Clarke of the Executive Committee accompanied me. We were certainly most hospitably treated by President Laurie Copping and helped by John Gooch and Marion Bachelor. It was a wonderful evening. We thoroughly enjoyed meeting the members there.

The Guest Speaker was Robert J. King, Secretary of the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade. Mr King is also the author of "The Secret History of the Convict Colony". This book delves into the pre 1788 intrigue in Bourbon and Spanish courts concerning British security and their threats to the Spanish supply of silver from Peru from which the Spanish military machine of the time was being financed.

The Spanish were aware of the Botany Bay plans and, at the time, even speculated on the use of the "Brigando" from the colony being deployed against them in Peru.

As one who is not convinced that the colonisation of Australia was mainly to dispose of convicts, I found Mr. King's material revealing of much evidence to show Britain had other reasons.

I must apologise to the King researchers for the information on Ann Innett and the Crossland's connection. Following further enquiries from King descendants, I carefully examined the actual documents. The Wentworth papers have now been checked and were found to have been wrongly indexed. The faulty index should have been for Robinson not

Crossland as shown, as the documents do not support the index reference whatsoever. The Mitchell Library is being contacted to make the appropriate corrections.

The response to the proposal for a Brisbane Chapter has been very good and one can now be started. I propose to visit Brisbane in September to inaugurate the Chapter. All local members will be personally invited by mail to attend the meeting.

In the near future I also hope to visit Moroya to commence a Chapter there.

I have been looking at the petition to sack William Bligh before the "Rum Rebellion" and the endorsement of Col. Johnston's actions later. I have substituted their wive's names in lieu of the signatories. I am not finished yet but a pattern is shaping up. Seventeen (of the 130 wives) were first fleeters (so far) with fifteen from the "Lady Penrhyn" which carried Esther Abrahams, Col. Johnston's wife. They have so far though, been out done by the women off the "William Pitt". This was an Irish female transport. Col. Johnston's assigned convict was James Sheedy whose wife, Jane Black, came from that ship. The power of the Colonial women may have been much greater than recorded at the time. Perhaps it was Mrs Bligh who was meant to be deposed!!

We all know the Raj was in Ceylon but it

seems that Britain used part of the N.S.W. Corps to take it.

First Fleeter James Walbourne and his Colonial born son appear to have been among those sent. Perhaps the Battle of Kandy was Australia's first military involvement. More work though is needed to verify this.

I was most saddened to learn of the recent death of Associate Member, Chris Cacouris. Chris was a Greek-American who served with distinction as an Officer in the United States in Korea. Later he migrated to Australia where he met and married Audrey. Audrey is a descendant of First Fleeter's Mary Spencer and James Squire and Thomas Smith and Ann Colpits.

It was Chris who tracked down evidence of Francis's service in the Army commencing at the age of 1 year 5 months. (Lieutenant Ross was only 9 years old), proved his service in the 11th Devonshires and his marriage to Jane Mary Smith, proved Governor Arthur Phillip's records were faulty on Squire and tracked down Squire's original conviction for highway robbery in 1774 (not 1784). The leap in data on Squire was tremendous. Chris donated his evidence to the Fellowship. Thank you Chris. Members of the Fellowship, join me in expressing our deepest sympathy to Audrey.

SYDNEY CUSTOMS HOUSE

Sydney's Customs House closed its doors for the last time following a colourful decommissioning ceremony on June 15 this year. For 145 years the sandstone building has occupied the site where it is believed Arthur Phillip and his party of First Fleeters raised the British Flag at the head of Sydney Cove. But the grand old building, officially opened by Governor Gipps in April 1845, had another link with the First Fleet. The prime-mover of the project to build Sydney's first permanent Customs House was

Colonel John Gibbes, Collector of Customs for N.S.W. from 1834 to 1859. Gibbes' son William was married to Harriet Jamison (1819-1896), the daughter of Sir John Jamison of Regentville and granddaughter of First Fleet surgeon and pioneer, Dr. Thomas Jamison (1745-1811). Coincidentally Dr. Jamison had occupied in 1808 the position of Naval Officer of the Port and among his duties was the administration of customs tariffs.

A STORY OF INTEREST. FIRST FLEETER JOHN McCARTHY (circa 1758-1846)

Our thanks go to Joan Schoch #5744 for supplying the following information on FF John McCarthy as requested in the May/June issue of this Newsletter.

From early church records, 1835-1854, comes the following notation: "McCarthy Jno died Kinlochewe 1846, age 100 years, number in register 40382".

Kinlochewe was surveyed in 1839 and

took the aboriginal name for the parish, Kalkallo, meaning "tall trees". The original road through Kinlochewe followed much the present line taken by the Hume Highway through Kalkallo.

One notable variation was the site of the settlement. A village reserve was set aside embracing the Merri Creek where it crossed by the summer settlement of Kinlochewe, which initially was of more importance than the scattered settlement further north.

In 1841 Francis and Kenneth Murison opened Kinlochewe Inn. In 1844 the Inn was purchased by John McCarthy's son-in-law, William Hartley Budd.

The Inn was described as of 14 rooms, partly wood, partly brick. It stood on 160 acres of land, 50 acres planted with fruit trees and gardens, and the remaining 100 acres of grazing divided into six paddocks.

Kinlochewe depended for its existence on a flow of travellers across its ford, a passage sustained only easily in summer or dry times. Gradually the alternative route through Campbellfield was favoured by both travellers and road builders.

The fires of Black Thursday, 1851, devastated Kinlochewe, including total destruction of the Inn. With traffic utilising the permanent though difficult Sydney road in preference to the seasonal vagaries of the Kinlochewe ford, rebuilding was not an economical proposition and the village was abandoned.

By 1853, only farmers were listed. Two dwellings survive in Kinlochewe and they are classified by the National Trust.

Father Geoghegan, who conducted John McCarthy's service, was the first Catholic priest in the Port Phillip district. He conducted masses in a house in central Melbourne before building St.Francis's Church in Lonsdale Street, Melbourne. The nearest Catholic Church to Kinlochewe in 1846 would have been at Pentridge (present day Coburg).

Joan Schoch was not able to identify John McCarthy's actual burial site, but we are grateful for the information she was able to send us. The Argus newspaper in which John McCarthy's death was reported went out of publication in the 1950's.

We have recently acquired a photograph and further information on Ann Lucas eldest child of FF Nathanial Lucas and Olivia Gascoigne from Mary Ormesher of Victoria. Mary is a descendant of Frances Faro, only child of Ann's second marriage to Thomas Faro in Launceston V.D.L.

Ann Faro (previous Williams, nee Lucas) died on 15th July, 1864 at Dunedin Hospital, New Zealand.

We now have all the birth, marriage and death details of the first generation Lucas family and photographs of Ann the eldest child and Thomas the youngest child.

Please also note on Pg.75 of the book "Nathanial and Olivia", the incorrect details of the marriage of Nathaniel

Jnr. where published. The correct marriage is to Ann Jane Young at St. Johns Church of England, Launceston on 1st August, 1845. No issue to the marriage is known. Nathaniel being 52 years old and Ann 44 years old.

6th AUSTRALIAN CONGRESS ON GENEALOGY AND HERALDRY

With less than one year to go, detailed planning for the Congress is now well in hand. Correction of information on Percy Morrisby:-

PERCY FRANK (not James) MORRISBY

enlisted in the 1st A.I.F. in Tasmania (not South Africa).

Registration Number 1625, a private the 15th Battalion 1st A.I.F. He joined the services on 10-12-1914 and was killed at Lone Pine on 8-5-1915. He has no known grave on Gallipoli, and is said to have been buried 'ina' mass grave' on Lone Pine with other servicemen.

JACK WARNER. FF John Nichols

Registration Number 1305, joined up 15-9-1914, was in the first landing at Gallipoli being evacuated on medical grounds, returning to Anzac Cove on 7-11-1915. He was wounded twice in Belgium and twice in France being discharged on 20-2-1919. He then joined the 2nd A.I.F (NX16673) 15-5-1940 aged 51 showing his age as 37 years. He served in the Middle East and Syria being discharged medically unfit, he then returned to his love of the sea as he was on windjammers before and between both wars. He served in the merchant navy till the end of the war passing away in 1964.

His father, John Warner served in the Sudan War, Boer War and 1st World War.

To His Brother Jim MacLean #2571 (FF Henry Kable/Susannah Holmes), 3rd June, 1941, written with a lead pencil, when he was hold up in Tobruk during the Siege. The Battalion later returned to Australia after El Alimein to be trained in jungle warfare. They were at the landing of the troops at Lae and Finch Haven.

Dear Jim,

Well old boy here is Tobruk calling from amid the dust, and a far from cheerful place it is believe you me, and I'll bet your much more comfortable in your quarters in Darwin than we are here, this underground living is no where near as nice a place to live in as it sounds.

Tomorrow, makes my twelve months service in the Army and what changes I've been lucky enough to have seen. My travels have taken me into Libya as far as any of our troops have ever been and there is not much of it that would be worth a square foot of North Qld. In our mad scramble back from Mersa Brega, we were unlucky enough to loose quite a number of men and among them was Alf Potter, whom you will probably remember as the big chap who was master of ceremonies at our hectic party at the canteen in Darwin, last October, all this happened about seven weeks back. After about 13 days of it, to use his own words, he got a bit sick of "working for nothing" so he walked out and two days ago he walked into our HQ after having been some five weeks on the road, complete with beard that would be a credit to Buckley of "Buckley's Chance" fame. Despite his hard trip he was in the best of spirits.

He received a grand welcome, as you may believe, and is quite the hero of the town because wandering 100 odd miles in behind Jerrys Lines is rather a grand feat. They packed him off for a few days spell but it won't be long before he should be back with us.

Miller another one who was at our night out was also reported missing believed killed in an air-raid in Tobruk, and on the same day as Alf Potter came back we had a surprise letter from him and he was in a Base Hospital some where in Egypt so it was a good day all round for the Sigs.

Next Day

This letter was interrupted while I went and patched up a phone line hence the delay in getting it finished. I saw Bunny Hoskins two or three times last week, and he looks very fat and well, and seems to have filled out a lot since I last saw him. He has had a grand time since leaving Australia and reckons England is quite a bit on Libya. Ernie Lee is also here, or so I am led to believe but as you probably guess I have not seen him yet. Mick Peel, I am told is missing, and Ernie Lavell is wounded but all the rest of the boys are all fit and "Rarin to go".

During our trip up to Marsa Brega we passed Bengasi and though I had read about the 60 planes destroyed on the ground there, I had not taken much notice of them, but what a sight, planes in all stages and positions of ruins you never saw such a mess in all your life. There is one thing I'm glad your job keeps both your feet on the ground, I have seen a couple of good Dog Fights, one on Easter Monday, especially, and believe me it was rather hectic and in about five minutes seven planes were crashing. They would just have no chance of persuading me to put myself in one of those crates.

The two Gearys Rusty Martin and young Chuck Robersts are all OK and none the worse for the desert life. As I told you earlier the Sigs are all OK-Oh No! you remember the fellow you met in Darwin who directed you to... to find..... Well he left the Sigs and went to the Coy store well he is a P.O.W. Jock Stevens was the name.

Well paper is getting scarce and I've got to keep within the bounds as to the letters I write and beside I'm not to sure if it isn't a wasted effort writing you as I much doubt getting a reply. Give my regards to Bill also to Dora if your still the man that comes around though if you run true to form she is well and truly forgotten.

LETTER TO MRS CLARKE

FROM BETTY JEFFREY about the disappearance of her daughter Mary Clarke FF James Bloodworth.

Mary and Betty Jeffrey were Nursing Sisters attached to the 10th Australian General Hospital, at Singapore, 1940-42.

At the fall of Singapore the nurses were evacuated. They left Singapore on the "Vyner Brooke" together with a number of civilians, including children, bound for Australia.

Just off Banka Strait the small unarmed ship was bombed by the Japanese. Passengers and crew had to abandon ship, but there were not sufficient life boats or rafts.

Mary, unfortunately could not swim. Those who could swim were able to get ashore but the raft Mary was on was swept out to sea and lost. Some of the nurses who did get to the shore were shot in the back by Japanese soldiers. The only survivor of this group was Sister Vivian Bulwinkel. Her amazing story was portrayed on T.V. last year.

Ailsa Avenue East Malvern Victoria, 23rd January, 1947.

Dear Mrs Clarke,

At last I have been able to get hold of your address as I would like to tell you that I was a friend of your daughter Mary - travelled to 10th A.G.H. Malacca with her, and was with her when she was last seen. I would like to tell you what happened.

Sixtyfive nursing sisters from Singapore 13th A.G.H., 2/4 c.c.s. and us (10th A.G.H.) left Singapore in the "Vyner Brooke", a tiny ship not much bigger than a Manly Ferry, on Thursday 12th February, 1942. We slept on the floor of the deck and lived there too until Saturday 14th February, when we were found by Japanese Bombers, who did their best to sink our ship, and, after a while, succeeded. Some sisters and many wounded civilians and sisters were able to get away and ashore in two life boats - there were girls in Sister Bulwinkel's party - thirty one sisters swam, and after many hours landed on Banka Island, while some of the girls were drowned owing to the rough seas, strong currents and the blackest night on record. Our ship sank at 2.30pm and just before darkness came, I swam to a raft where I could see grey uniforms. Mary was there - cheery as ever and greeted me as if we had met in the street. You

could imagine that. There were many civilian women, two Eurasian children, two wounded (not badly) Malay sailors, Matron Paschke and six of our sisters - far far too many for such a tiny raft.

Before long we soon had it organised as we were quite ten miles from land and had a long way to go. Sister Ennis sat on the raft and held the two children - two slightly wounded but very dazed sisters were also on the raft. Matron, Sister Harper and I took it in turns all that terrible night with the tow tiny paddles - just pieces of packing case and very rough. The remaining sisters, women and two sailors were in the water and hung on to the rope at the sides and kicked their feet to help us propel the awkward raft and all its weight through the very strong currents. All through the night we kept changing positions with those in the water to rest them. On many occasions we nearly got to the edge of the breakers but each time we were carried swiftly out to sea again, and it was hopeless. We nearly reached a wharf and later, a lighthouse, but currents would drive us away again. We even ran into part of the Japanese fleet who refused to pick us up as they were about to attack Muntok. At 4 a.m. we saw them take Muntok.

When daylight came, we were many miles out to sea once more and much further down the coast and could not see a sign of anybody or anything but the Jap ships away in the distance. Shore was just visible, not beaches, but trees. Something had to be done. We has wasted all our energy and were further away than at 6 p.m. the night before. As I had burnt my hands very badly getting off the "Vyner Brooke", rowing for twelve hours with a piece of packing case had worn my fingers and palms until the bones were exposed and they were so painful I couldn't row any more. So I got off the raft. I couldn't even hold the rope so I just floated alongside the raft. Sister Harper was so tired after her long effort at the other paddle, so she got off too. We also made the heavy Malay sailors leave the raft as they wouldn't help at all and they also swam with the two sisters. This is much better for those on the raft. It then was able to float on the surface instead of just below the surface. Mary and Sister Ennis took over the paddles and Matron took the children in her arms. Everybody changed over and we set out once more. The sailors, Sister Harper and I slowly swimming a few yards ahead to lead the way while the raft followed. We were very

happy about this and our chat was very bright although we were all desperately tired and longing to sleep. We made good progress for a long time, then suddenly the raft was caught in a current that missed us, as they were carried out to sea again and as we had lifebelts on, we could not catch them - only try and keep waving, but they went further away from us each minute. The currents separated we four swimmers; after a few hours we didn't see the Malays again and, after a long long gruelling swim in the sea and mangrove swamps, Sister Harper and I finally reached shore two days later. We were rescued by native fishermen on the following Tuesday morning. That is the last any of us saw of Matron Paschke, Mary and the other four sisters and all through those long years as a prisoner I felt sure they would turn up again, perhaps in Singapore, as the raft seemed to be going towards a Japanese destroyer, and the Japanese navy did rescue people who were shipwrecked in Banka Straits as they brought some English Sisters and civilian women into our camp a day or so after we arrived.

Mary, Jean Greer, Beryl Woodbridge, two Sydney Physiotherapists, Merrille and Nan, and I had a grand trip over to Malaya in June 1941, and we had a wonderful sojourn in Malacca when we were off duty. What a happy family we were! Later on, in Singapore we were all so busy we didn't seem to see each other until we were taken in ambulances to the wharf to join the "Vyner Brooke".

Mary was a sweet girl, always so happy and bright and she was still chatting away gaily when I saw her last. I am terribly sorry we could not bring her home to you. Please remember always we did try to get all those girls ashore.

I was discharged from hospital only two months ago, but I have to go back for a few months treatment after I have had a small holiday. I'm so tired of being a patient.

Mrs Clarke, I hope this dreadful story has told you what you must want to know. I have wanted so often to write to Mary's mother and tell her, but I only received your address last night from Jean Greer, who is in Melbourne now on her way back to Singapore. Perhaps one day I may see you. My sister-in-law comes from Rylestone and she is anxious for me to stay with her family - Mr and Mrs Thompson at "Wingarra" - when I get away from

hospitals finally. How I look forward to that day.

I have very few snaps of our Malacca days. Mine all went down with the ship, but I have two here with Mary in a group - one taken at the Swimming Club showing Sisters Pump, Mary, me, Jennie Greer, "Woodie" - and the other taken in Singapore standing by a taxi - Merrille, Mary, Nan and "Woodie". If you haven't a copy of these, I will get some copies taken off and will send them to you.

I apologise for the length of this letter, but there was so much to tell you. I hope it hasn't upset you too much.
