
Bus transfers will be organised for all dinners, tours and ceremonies at Kingston.

Battles by the BLACKS

ALTHOUGH EIGHTEEN YEARS HAVE PASSED SINCE THE FOUNDATION OF THIS COLONY, THE BLACKS IN THE IMMEDIATE VICINITY OF PORT JACKSON STILL CARRY ON THEIR TRIBAL WARFARE TO THE DEATH.

SYDNEY, 26th January 1806

esterday, a contest nearly proved fatal to Bennelong, who in flying from an otherwise inevitable destruction received a spear in his hip. In spite of the assiduous training given to Bennelong by Governor Phillip, and his introduction to civilising habits, during his visit to England, Bennelong still remains the compleat savage, given over to intemperance.

The recontre yesterday was for the purpose of inflicting punishment on Blowit, the murderer of Musquito, and on little Pigeon likewise, who had taken an active part against the deceased.

Their assailants were Bennelong, Cathai Coleby, Nanbury, Wilhamanan, and old White: a spear from the latter of whom striking the upper area of Blowit's shield, carried away the wood, and penetrated in a descending direction, nearly about an inch below the left eye through the nose, making a ghastly wound. Nearly at the same instant Pigeon received a spear through the leg.

Friends of these unfortunates were near at hand and Colinjong, likewise esteemed for his friendly disposition towards his European acquaintances, advanced with a poised spear towards Bennelong. At the

instant he was about to throw, he received

a barbed
weapon in the breast from
Nanbury, who was concealed in
a thicket. In a few seconds Colinjong
expired and Nanbury and Coleby
immediately fled; but Bennelong also
pursuing the same course was overtaken
by his adversaries, two attacking from the
front and two pressing in from behind.

Those in front at length obliged him to stand, and he scarcely warded off their spears, when turning with surprising agility he caught also the spears from his two hindmost opponents.

Numbers were now coming up to assault him; flight was his only hope of security, and how he contrived to escape with a single wound was a matter of astonishment to all present.

The remainder of the evening was devoted to the funeral rites of poor Colinjong, who, it is believed, will be interred today, in one of the bays near Woola-Moola.

It will be recalled, that on Thursday the day after Christmas last, a desperate contest also took place among the natives, when the opposing tribes from Broken Bay, and that living between Sydney and Botany Bay, made battle near the Military Barracks. The cause of the dispute was the latest love affair of Wilhamanan, a native remarkable for his manly courage, as well as for his outrageous manners, and who recently succeeded in taking away by force the wife of a native of the Broken Bay tribe.

For a long time, the warriors were prevented from conducting their war by the curiosity of the crowds of spectators, including most of the soldiers of the New South Wales Corps, who pressed in upon all sides. But as several Officers and Gentlemen commanded that no interruption or interference should be offered to their customs, the battle shortly after commenced, and in a few seconds, the field groaned beneath the weight of numbers falling under the waddy, whose aperient powers furnished in a twinkling of an eyelid, an unpleasant spectacle of fractured heads and half-expiring veterans.

In the initial shower of spears, which the combatants dodged with great dexterity, a private of the New South Wales Corps received one by accident in the foot.

Their mode of assault and defence with the waddy is certainly entitled to remark: for notwithstanding the most violent rage and impetuosity, yet the head is the only part guarded; every other part of the body being left open to the blow of the antagonist, who never avails himself of the advantage, but hammers at the head of him who endeavours to confer a lasting obligation on his own. The contest was truly spirited while it lasted.

In response to a letter I received from the John Herbert Family Association I checked and found that Deborah Ellem was not the descendant but that it was Hannah Bolton. There were two John Herberts in the First Fleet and our apologies to both Herbert families for getting this wrong!!

Vernon Curwin of 60 Middle Harbour Rd, Lindfield NSW 2070 ph. 02 9416 7261 advises that he has copies of the now out of print first volume of *A Rich Inheritance*. At First Fleet House we have quite a number of copies of the second volume and in the past have had inquiries from members re the first volume. Both are excellent volumes about the genesis of this family in our nation.

In the last issue I made comment re First Fleet descendants and the Olympic

Games. I received an interesting response from member, the Hon Max Evans (FF Edward Garth), that his son Peter received a gold medal at the Moscow Olympics in the 4 x 100 metre relay swimming event and at the same venue a bronze medal in the 100 metre backstroke. He fronted up again at the Los Angeles Games winning a bronze medal in the same events. Max also informed me that Multiplex Pty Ltd, builders of Stadium Australia, the venue of our successful Games, is owned by member John Roberts, a proud descendant of Ann Forbes. The success of members of our generation leads me to repeat a quote that I use in my talks to various service clubs in the Sydney area ... 'whatever the circumstances of their arrival, the First Fleeters soon acquired a character which is both different in their nature from their origins and similar to each other in their newly adopted land. A character with characteristics such as self reliance, initiative, and a sense of fair play. Over succeeding generations we are still integrating those qualities handed down by our first arrivals'. Worth a thought isn't it?

I arrived back in Sydney after a few days sojourn with my family at Byron Bay to find an invitation from the Lord Mayor of Sydney to a reception for the Lord Mayor of Portsmouth at Sydney Town Hall. This was a good opportunity to put forward the precepts, aims and ideals of the Fellowship. The Lord Mayor of Portsmouth was most interested in our organisation and I was pleased to present to him some publications of First Fleet history.

On the 11 November last I attended at the invitation of the Premier, accompanied by my ten-year-old grandson, Thomas Champion, the 82nd anniversary of the end of World War I at the Cenotaph in Martin Place.

The John Small/Mary Parker Family Association gathering was held at Ryde in October. A wonderful family gathering in memory of these two First Fleeters and I was privileged to conduct their annual election of officers of that organisation. After the church service I was privileged to take part in the dedication of a stone seat in memory of these two First Fleeters.

On 12 November last, both Doug and myself, with Ron and Zona Maguire, attended the plaque ceremony in memory of Thomas Freeman FF at St. John's Cemetery, Parramatta. We had a good roll up courtesy of the Parramatta Historical Society, details of the ceremony in this issue. The President's welcome at First Fleet House on 22 October last attracted but one new member, Barry Roberts. Perhaps you may note, new and 'old' members, future welcomes to First Fleet House next year. I guarantee it is well worth a visit!!! Since I last reported to

you I have spread the word to seven service clubs making a total of over 2,000 people who have heard about the First Fleet and some of our pioneers during the year and I look forward to speaking to West Beecroft Probus before Christmas. I already have a number of engagements in the New Year which will no doubt multiply before the year's end. All of us, no doubt, look forward to the coming Centenary celebrations of Federation. As yet the Fellowship has had no indication to what part it can play on 1 January. After all, without the First Fleet there would have been no Federation?

May I take this opportunity in wishing all of you, and yours, a very Happy and Holy Christmas and may it be a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

The Jovernor's Role

How much do we owe Governor Phillip? A resolute, sensitive man; beginning this Nation's climb From its primitive, disorganised conception, To a country, now established, sublime. His selection for the task, quietly taken; Naval heritage, for an unusual fare -To transfer tall ships and their cargoes To down-under: building a penal colony there. He would govern with patience and reason: be successful, His adaptable personality claiming the days; With staid mission ahead for this colony's start -From raw beginnings, along uncertain ways. His commission indefinite; yet to create a gaol, Isolated and distant; so conveniently approved -With involvements, most local, not relating to home, But for convicts, so remotely removed. He first raised the good flag; formal ceremony's joust For possession, to establish foundation. Then a hurried camp settlement, to call early musters And from now on time's hopeful salvation. When we think now on all Phillip's tasks, we are undaunted. No present day thoughts could he face, He was land-locked, and for time-span included, Had only harsh ordeals to embrace. Yet he sought to sustain all in outlook -Mid food shortages, and when confronting extremes. Though supplies from Old England were promised on time Only time's extra delays were supreme. He must send ships to gain more provisions, To Norfolk, a short trip the first; Another bold trip across oceans afar, Besides seeking East Indies berths. And we know now resources were near him, Only few miles to north later found. The Hunter, just waiting, for venturers' claim, Where cultivation, clean water, live stock would abound. But what his great journey with many ships Brought to this land, and with following trips, Was a build-up in time's speed, so slowly For loose development, sure, yet more boldly. His stay in command was but four years, A gubernatorial term of short span. Yet classic it was, to his stay here ashore, That his presence supported growth's plan. And if but today, and with time in reverse, He could stand here, on land that he started first, His permanent monument – he would know it to be

THOMAS FREEMAN

1742-1794

he Fellowship of First Fleeters in a joint venture with the Parramatta and District Historical Society on Sunday 12 November, 2000, held a dedication service at St. John's

Cemetery, Parramatta, for the attachment of a plaque on the tombstone of First Fleeter Thomas Freeman. The service commenced at 3.00pm when President Peter Christian, of the Fellowship of First Fleeters, welcomed all in attendance.

Judith Dunn, Vice-President of the Parramatta and District Historical Society, during her researches at St John's historic cemetery discovered the grave of Thomas Freeman and excitedly spread the word. Judith, who was instrumental in assembling such an enthusiastic gathering for the dedication, gave a brief exposition of the history imbuing St John's cemetery.

President of the Parramatta and District Historical Society, John McClymont gave a short history of Freeman.

Thomas Freeman joined Sirius as clerk on 25 October 1786, discharged by order of Admiral Hood from the Portsmouth guardship Ganges, where he had served as able seaman.

> On February 1788 he was appointed under commissary Port at Jackson, and as such he issued clothing to the women on Prince of Wales and

Lady Penrhyn before they landed on the 5th. On 13 July Freeman wrote to Evan Nepean (Under Secretary of State for the Home Office) to tell of his work in charge of the laboratory



and agricultural implements, tallying them in and out daily. He asked for a colonial salary, as he had done this work without pay other than as on the books of Sirius.

He was discharged from Sirius on 9 July and went to Norfolk Island as deputy storekeeper on 1 August 1790 by Surprize.


Freeman returned to Port Jackson and was serving at Parramatta when he died at the age of 52 and was buried at St John's on 2 November 1794.

His tombstone reads as follows:
SACRED
TO THE MEMORY
OF
THOMAS FREEMAN DEPUTY
COMMISSY
WHO DEPARTED THIS LIFE
OCT 25 TH 1794
AGED 52 YEARS

A welcome newcomer to our historical unity, the new Rector of St John's, the Reverend David Mulready, was pleased to


give a Dedication Prayer over the gravesite of John Freeman, First Fleeter.
