

Peter Christian OAM

100

Peter was born in Five Dock on 18th July 1927, and became a third generation pharmacist. He is a descendant of William Tunks, Marine, Sirius, and Sarah Lyons, convict on Second Fleet. Married to Joy Hammond on 4th September1954. Joy is a descendant of Matthew Everingham, convict First Fleet, and a kinsman of Charles Sturt. Peter and Joy have four children and nine grandchildren.

A drastic incentive started his career in genealogy. In 1979 he suffered a cardiac arrest and in 1980 had open heart surgery. Joy, in self-preservation mode, suggested to Peter that to occupy his time he could take up genealogy as a hobby. He became President of Fellowship of First Fleeters 1986-1990 and 1993 to date. He naturally followed on to Patron of Tunks Descendants Association and the John Herbert Family Association.

In finalising his presidency, the Christians go to Perth WA for the wedding of his other son Nicholas in November. After which they head for the United Kingdom for Christmas. While in the UK they will be in Portsmouth where Peter hopes to renew friendships with members of the Sydney-Portsmouth Sister City Committee. Peter has Life Membership of the First Fleeters and two school parent bodies. He was an inaugural member of the Sydney University Pharmacy Alumni Council and is a Life Trustee of St. James's Church, King Street, Sydney. He is a member of the Epping Computer Pals Group and has for some years helped in the teaching of his peer group the mysteries of computers.

For the past two years has been in demand from various organisations as a speaker on the First Fleet, people on that Fleet, and their descendants. His forbear, James Christian, arrived in the Colony in 1840 from County Wicklow, Ireland, with his wife and children to join his father-in-law William Warren an emancipated convict who had a land grant in the Liverpool region.

Peter is not lost to the Fellowship as he has many bookings in train for talks to varied institutions, and we wish him well.

Convict Profile: David Kilpack [aka Killpack]

born circa 1757 died 30.11.1797

David Kilpack was sentenced at the Old Bailey in 1783 for the theft of one Turkey, two Roosters, two Hens, two Ducks and one Gander.!!!

One may be forgiven that this First Fleeter had a thing about birds, albeit feathered ones!

For this he received seven years transportation to the American colonies.

He was one of a number of convicts on the transport Swift who mutinied and took over the ship off the Sussex coast. He was recaptured and sentenced to death, later commuted to Life Transportation, and arrived in the Colony on Scarborough in 1788.

He married Second Fleet convict Eleanor McDonald in 1791 and having been granted a Conditional Pardon received the first land grant of 30 acres in the North Brush in the Field of Mars, now part of the south-western area of the Hornsby Shire. Carlingford Road now bisects this grant.

In 1795 he received a further 50 acres and we are told that he was industrious in his new-found way of life. In June 1797 he was employed as an overseer to John Macarthur.

He died at the early age of 40 years on 30th November 1797 and was buried at St. John's Cemetery, Parramatta. His only son, David, died some three months later at the age of 15 months. He had three daughters born previously. One of his descendants married into the Milson Family.

His widow later married in 1799 to an emancipist Thomas Higgins who had arrived on Surprise, Second Fleet, in 1790. Eleanor died 28th September 1835 aged 81 and was buried with David at Parramatta.



The Fellowship held a Memorial Plaque service at the cemetery on Sunday 12th March 1978, the eulogy being given by descendant Joy Wallman in the presence of our then President, Mrs Beryl Lewis, the Mayor of Parramatta and a number of Fellowship members. He had the following children by Eleanor McDonald: Martha b. 16.2.1792; Elizabeth b. 16.6.1793; Eleanor McGill b. 30.5.1795; David b. 9/11/1796.

His epitaph on the tombstone reads,

David Kilpack died 30th November 1797
Aged 40 years
He was a loving Husband
An affectionate Father
And a sincere Friend.

On Saturday 19th August, 2006, Hornsby Shire Council held a Memorial Plaque Service to honour the memory of this First Fleeter who obtained the very first land grant in the shire. It was held at Kilpack Park, Carlingford, in the presence of a number of descendants and dignitaries of the area, where a Memorial Cairn was unveiled.

It was a distinct privilege for me to represent the Fellowship of First Fleeters at this event, to recognise one who had made a new start in life under such inauspicious circumstances, and became a pioneer of our Nation.


Australia Day Celebration 26th January 2007

The Sale of First Fleet Artefacts

Two unusual artefacts with connections to the First Fleet have recently featured in auction sales.



The first was a very simple silver snuff box. It is 6.5 cm long and I.6 cm high and largely elliptical in shape. On the inside of its hinged lid it is inscribed "Lt Grant To Governor King June 4 1801". The snuff box had remained in the King family until its recent sale. It has been described a possibly the earliest sur-

viving and documented piece of Australia silver.

James Grant was a naval officer who was the first officer to sail to Sydney from England via Bass Strait. He did so when he brought out a survey ship, the 'Lady Nelson', to be used by Matthew Flinders to chart the Australian coastline. Upon his arrival he was intended to transfer to the 'Supply' which we would then command. Upon his arrival in Sydney, in December 1800, he found that Flinders had already left Sydney for England and the 'Supply' had been condemned as unseaworthy. Governor King, who had earlier described him as "a very good seaman but no Artist", decided to continue to use him to chart the coast waters of south east Australia. Between March and May 1801 he charted Bass Strait and in June 1804 he explored the Hunter River and surveyed the area in preparation for the settlement of what is now Newcastle. He arrived in the Hunter on 14 June 1804.

After this exploration Grant was immersed in some of the political wrangling between King and Macarthur which resulted in his requesting permission to return to England. He left the Colony, never to return, in November 1801.

The questions therefore arise as to why this present was given and what was special about 4 June 1804?

The second artefact was a table to which was attached a label saying that it was made in London from beefwood planks shipped by surgeon John White. The table was sold by descendants of Sir Andrew Snape Hammond. It was Hammond who had recommended White to be appointed as chief surgeon on the First Fleet. While described as beefwood this is apparently a timber from north western NSW and the timber (which only forms a veneer to the table) is most likely from a casuarina that grew around Botany Bay and was used by the early colonists for kindling because

it split so readily. The Sydney Morning Herald quoted an unnamed forester as saying that this was a "bastard of a timber to work with".


It was not unusual for early colonists (like White) to send unusual items back to their patrons in England. Sir Joseph Banks was a recipient of a large number of items. Similarly, the daughters of George Johnston sent a large number of botanical and feathered specimens back to his patron Lord Percy, Duke of Northumberland.

And as for the sales, the snuff box sold for \$156,000 and the table for \$292,755.

Beefwood was a name applied to several Australian trees, unconnected apart from their resembling each other in the red colour of their timber, for example, casuarina.
