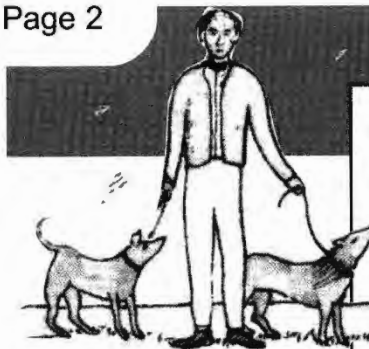

House Committee Report 2006

Two thousand and six has been a challenging initiation for me in my role as a Director and House Committee Member of the Fellowship of First Fleeters. First Fleet House is an older building and as such is in regular need of maintenance and TLC to keep it functional and a suitable place from which to conduct the activities of the FFF.

To comply with current standards, smoke alarms have been fitted in strategic locations, downstairs and upstairs within the building. Due to the extended dry seasons that Sydney has been experiencing for the last couple of years there has been some settlement take place at the rear of First Fleet House. Cracks have appeared in several rooms and although advice has been received that the structural integrity of the building has not been compromised. The situation is being monitored regularly. Due to the movement at the rear of the building some repairs have also been necessary to the back verandah. A quote has been accepted and the necessary work is scheduled to be carried out shortly. Repairs have been necessary to the roof at the front of the building to rectify a water leak that became evident during some unseasonable downpours. During the year the property was inspected and valued by local Estate Agents to keep your Directors informed of current property values in the area.

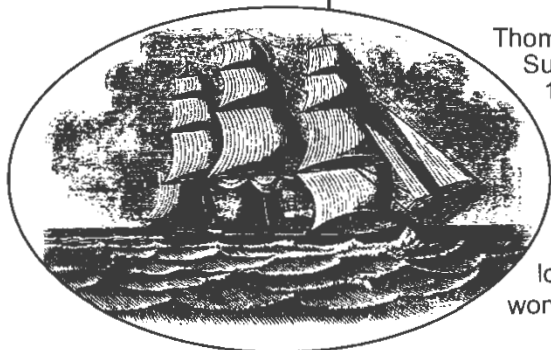

Thomas Arndell

This is an extract of a talk given to the daytime fellowship meeting on Wednesday 12th July by Marjorie Raven. Mrs Raven is the author of "Thomas Arndell in the Colony of NSW" and "Assistant Surgeon Thomas Arndell - The Man He Was Not".

Continued from Founders July-August 2006 (Issue 37, Number 4)



Thomas Arndell was granted a Patent of Appointment as Assistant Surgeon and sailed on the *Friendship* with the First Fleet in May 1787.

According to the letters of Lieutenant Ralph Clark during the voyage, on 1st November a letter arrived on board the *Friendship* for Thomas on the *Ranger* of London from Falmouth -- all mail for the First Fleet was dispatched from Falmouth. How I would love to read that letter - he probably just tossed it overboard! I wonder what was in it and who wrote it? I'll never know!

The first record of him in the Colony, again in the Ralph Clark Journal - Wednesday, 23rd January, 1788, going ashore with Clark and Davey on the south shore of Botany Bay, where he 'by accident run the knife through his hand - I bound it up and stopped the blood - I hope that the Commander will find out a better place at Port Jackson for us to settle'. This was an unfortunate incident on what was probably the Colony's first picnic.

The first tent hospital was erected on the western side of Sydney Cove where 91 George Street now stands, between Globe and Argyle Streets. Thomas along with nine other medical men on the First Fleet had contended with accidents, drunken brawls, sea sickness, childbirth and attending after lashings. Just to be on land to treat their patients must have been an enormous relief.

When Governor Phillip created a settlement at Rose Hill on 2nd November, 1788, he concentrated upon the orderly laying out of a township. Where convicts and free settlers were employed, medical services had to be provided so in 1789 Thomas was given charge of the hospital and was the first Superintendent. Captain Watkin Tench described the makeshift hospital as 'a most wretched hospital totally destitute of every convenience.'

In June, 1789, Thomas accompanied Watkin Tench, Mr Lowes, two marines and a convict on the second expedition of discovery from Parramatta. They headed

towards a hill five miles west from which they viewed the chain of mountains known as Carmarthen Hills and discovered a river 'as broad as the Thames at Putney and apparently of great depth'. This river was later named the Nepean. By March 1791 he had cleared his land at Parramatta and on 6th December he had six acres under cultivation and on 16th July, 1792, he was given the first land grant awarded to a civilian officer - 60 acres on the north side of the creek leading to Parramatta.

He erected a thatched dwelling at a cost of £15, but on 5th December the home, outbuildings and crops were destroyed by fire. The land was eventually resumed and the Female Orphanage was built on it, later part of Rydalmere Mental Hospital and now forms part of the campus of the University of Western Sydney.



Arndell named his property 'Caddie Park', above, and it remained in the Arndell family for seven generations until 1981 when it was acquired by the NSW State government and became part of the Cattai State Recreation Area.

On 10th July, 1792, he wrote to Governor Phillip requesting permission to retire from the service with a view to becoming a settler. His later land grants were 70 acres in 1794 at Pennant Hills, now part of Oatlands Golf Course, then 100 acres in 1799 in the Dundas District, at Thompson's Corner now part of West Pennant Hills; and 600 acres at Cattai in the District of Mulgrave Place, which he was farming in 1799 and breeding Spanish sheep. He built a crude building for his family, the foundations can still be seen, but in 1820 he built a more substantial home,

Caddie, at Cattai, which still remains (see picture) It is the only First Fleeter's home still standing. He died just two months before its completion but his wife, Elizabeth, continued living in the house with their eldest son until her death in 1843, aged 75.

In 1799 Thomas was appointed Justice of the Peace for Parramatta and two years later he was appointed Justice of the Peace for the Territory of New South Wales and became the first Magistrate at the Hawkesbury. From 1801 to 1809 he was Acting Surgeon at the Hawkesbury.

On 4th March, 1804, he wrote to Rev. Samuel Marsden. *'From strong and confirmed information I have every reason to believe that many of those deluded prisoners that call themselves United Irishmen and others have an insurrection in project this night, and I beg you will be so kind as to forward some ammunition with the bearer sent on purpose for our defence here'.*

Rev. Marsden was aware of the situation but the military in Parramatta or Sydney did not take the matter seriously and there had been many false alarms in the past but at 8pm the following night Rev. Marsden realised that the rebellion was serious. On 10th March Thomas requested *'a little more ammunition if you please'.*

In 1806 his pension of £50 per annum was discontinued without reason and he was unable to adequately provide support for his family, but six years later, he was paid the sum of £300 for *'arrears of allowance of £50 per annum'.* That must have been like winning Lotto!

The disastrous flood in March, 1806, came to within 18 inches of his family's home at Cattai. Rev. Marsden and Thomas were requested by Governor King to organise supplies and assistance to save settlers from drowning and starving at the Hawkesbury, and on 7th April they were appointed to a commission to report on loss and damage caused by the flood. They were each paid one guinea per day for carrying out this duty. The finding of the commission was that 36,000 acres of land were inundated and losses to stock, crops and building amounted to £35,248, with the loss of seven lives.

In 1809 the building of the Ebenezer Dissenting Chapel, now the Ebenezer Uniting Church, which was also used as a school, was completed. This is the oldest church in Australia in which services are still conducted. Services had been held in the Arndell home and in 1808 families on both sides of the Hawkesbury River met and agreed to build a school and church and members' subscriptions could be paid in cash or produce or livestock. The cost was over £400 - a formidable task for a small congregation.

An advertisement in The Sydney Gazette on Sunday, 2nd July, 1809, advertised the windmill on his property *To Let*. This is the first record of the oldest European industrial site in the Colony; there is no record of the year in which the eight-metre high windmill was erected but it is estimated to be 1804-5. It was used for grinding wheat and the track walked by the convicts to carry the bags of wheat on their backs from the river's edge is still clearly-visible. An archeological dig was carried out on the site in 1994 when traces of grain were found in the tamped earth floor.

Canadians Visit First Fleet House

The front office at First Fleet House became a hive of activity when 45 Canadians arrived in a coach to pay us a visit. On board was Canadian born Gail Puddicombe who had previously proved her ancestry to First Fleeters, Private Marine John McCarthy and Convict Ann Beardsley. FFF President Peter Christian OAM welcomed our visitors as they packed in to the tightly arranged seating. Peter spoke of the First Fleet and the genesis of settler Australia before presenting Gail with her membership certificate, a chart bearing the names of the First Fleeters and a metal badge. Doug Puddicombe (husband) attached a Canadian lapel badge to Peter's coat and made him a Canadian for the day. Gail spoke of her ancestry:

I am delighted to become a member of the Fellowship of First Fleeters. My Great-great-great-great-grandparents, John McCarthy and Ann Beardsley, arrived on 'Friendship' in 1788. He was a marine and she a convict. They lived at Sydney, and for a short spell on Norfolk Island. Their daughter, Mary Ann McCarthy, lived with a Lieut. Skottowe who wrote the 'Skottowe Manuscript' now a literary treasure in the Mitchell Library here in Sydney. Their son in turn returned to England with his father and later immigrated to Upper Canada in 1832. He became one of the first settlers and later the Chief of Police in Stratford Ontario. His family tried, fortunately unsuccessfully, to conceal the Chief's relationship to a convict, but the truth was out and I was able to prove my descent. It is a delightful irony to be a scion of pioneers in both Australia and Canada and to be related to both a convict and a police chief. I am pleased to become a member of the Fellowship and to be here with you today.

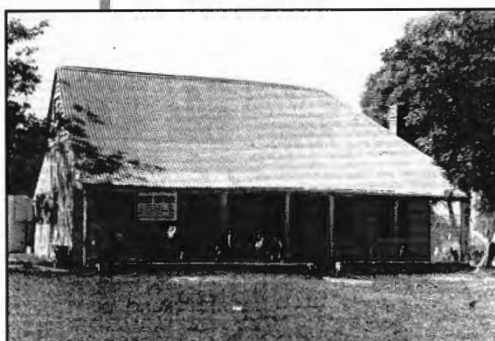
