On Saturday afternoon 11th April I attended the Waldron Mc Carthy, Memorial Lecture for the Hurstville Historical Society at the Civic Centre Hurstville. This year the Speaker was Mr. Keith Johnson, President of the Society of Australian Genealogists - his subject "Study in Genealogy". The sculpture, Stephen Walker, has placed great emphasis on the flora and fauna that would have been in this area in the early days of the colony. I deemed it a great honour to be a guest at the official opening by the Lord Mayor of Sydney, Alderman Douglas Sutherland, and also at luncheon on board the John Cadman Floating Restaurant. It was a glorious day and the Harbour at its magnificent best.

APRIL LECTURE EVENING.

The April Lecture Evening was on an interesting subject -"Edmund Blacket his Life, and His Church Buildings 1817 - 1883" The Speaker, a husband and wife team, Bev and John McClymont, Lecturers for Historical Societies.

They made the talented architect come to life, and we felt we knew the humble Edmund Blacket after the most interesting lecture.

The lecture began with Blacket and his wife Sarah, a young couple travelling across the world to escape parental disappoval of their marriage, and they were the new type of Australian immigrant that was replacing the former convict transportees to the colony of New South Wales, they arrived in Sydney Cove in 1842

Edmund Blacket's task ahead of him was to find work. He formerly worked as a surveyor and had learnt basic training in Building. He wrote letters to important people, including Charles Nicholson, Thomas Sutcliffe Mort and William Grant Broughton, the recently ordained Bishop of Australia, who was to start the shy and modest Edmund Blacket on a career of great, if quiet, brilliance. By January 1843 he had been appointed valuator to Bourke Ward of the City. The official notice in the Sydney Morning Herald, misspelled his name as Mr. Blackett - this happened throughout his life.

On 18th January 1843, he delivered to Bishop Broughton the design of his first Australian building, a church for Patrick Plains. . Building techniques were simple compared to modern methods, allowing an intelligent man to master them with comparative ease. He had a great enthusiasm for Architecture, and was delighted when Bishop Broughton commissioned him to design a church. Patrick Plains was the general area of Singleton in the Hunter River Valley, and this church was to become All Saints, Singleton.

For Forty years from 1843 - 1883 Blacket worked as Colonial Architect, designing churches and the magnificent buildings of Sydney University, houses and banks. But his most well known works are his churches. He could design a church for a meagre budget or a lavish one. Here are a few of his wonderful church buildings - St. Philips (Church Hill)

(Church Hill) (Gordon) (Woollahra) St. Johns All Saints (North Sydney)
(delightful Gothic church Watson's Bay)
(Newtown)
(Berrima) St. Thomas! St. Peter's St. Stephen Holy Trinity St. Mark's (Picton) and many more.

On Friday 9th February 1883, Edmund Blacket did not arrive at his office, his long - enduring friendships and his richly crowded life was over.

A plaque on the wall in the south-west corner of St. Andrews Cathedral says the ashes are near by. And so there are laid Edmund Blacket and his much loved wife Sarah - with a whole cathedral of his design for their tombstone. c/fwd:...

ANTHONY ROPE AND ELIZABETH PULLEY.

Anthony Rope was charged At Chelmsford Essex on 7th March, 1785 for burglary, by breaking and entering the house of Robt. Gosling and stealing 2 cotton gowns, 1 petticoat and shoes, a mans hat and coins, value 35 shillings. He was sentenced to 7 years and transportation. He sailed on the "Alexander" on the First Fleet.

Elizabeth Pulley or (Powley) spinster aged 26, was sentenced at Thetford, Norfolk on the 17th March 1783. She had burgled the dwelling house of a widow, Elizabeth Minns on 24th December, 1782, and stole 101bs. of cheese, raisins, bacon, 24 ozs butter, 7 lbs flour also 2 rolls of worsted. No doubt the food was to have been Xmas dinner. For this crime Elizabeth was "to hang by the neck till she be dead." She was reprieved and sentenced to 7 years and transportation. She sailed on the "Friendship" but was transferred to the "Prince of Wales" at the Cape, with other women convicts and their places taken by sheep, bought for the colony.

On arrival at Sydney Cove, Elizabeth Pulley and Anthony Rope were married on the 19th May 1788, John Summers and Elizabeth Mason witnesses to the marriage.

As a celebration to the event, a suppor party was held in the Rope's tent. The guests were Joseph Hatton, Elizabeth Mason, Frances Williams, Robert Ryan, James Price and Samuel Day. They all had "sea pie containing fresh meat, "a welcome change from the usual ration of salt pork.

On the 30th May, Capt. David Collins examined Joseph Hatton about the disappearance of a goat belonging to Lt. Johnston. He heard evidence from Hatton, Frances Williams, Elizabeth Mason and Ann Warburton. He committed James Price, Anthony and Elizabeth Rope and Samuel Day for trial. (c/fwd.)

On Monday 2nd June, the Criminal court sat and James Frice and Elizabeth and Anthony Rope were charged with stealing the goat's flesh.

After evidence was given by a number of others, it appears the goat was found dead as though an animal had killed it, and being still quite fresh, they took the liberty of making pie for the wedding dinner. All the accused were acquitted and the papers were signed by Capt. Collins.

On Sunday 2nd November, 1788, Robert the first son of Anthony and Elizabeth was christened. In February 1789, Anthony Rope and John Summers were ordered 25 lashes for not doing their work and in March 1791 Rope received 25 lashes for buying stolen shoes.

On Sunday 31st July, 1791, their daughter Mary was christened. In January 1792 they settled on land at the Ponds, 2 miles north east of Parramatta. Their farm is now the Catholic College on Missing Point Road. Another daughter Elizabeth was born in 1794, John 1795, Sarah 1798, William 1805 (whose birth does not appear to be registered) and Elizabeth Ann 1808.

The Rope family did not stay long at the Ponds, and in 1805 Anthony Rope is a free settler renting 48 acres from James Badgery on the Nepean. In 1806 his name is on an address of welcome to Governor Bligh from the Hawkesbury settlers.

They continued to farm and were still in the district of Evan on the 1828 census with 11 acres all under cultivation and 5 cattle.

Elizabeth died on the 9th August 1837 aged 80 years, and Anthony died on the 22nd April 1843. His age is given as 89. They were both buried at Castlereagh.
