FROM THE PRESIDENT

The following cable was sent to the Lord Mayor of Portsmouth on the occasion of the sailing of the Re-Enactment Fleet.

"The Executive and Members of the Fellowship of First Fleeters send greetings to the Lord Mayor, Councillors and people of the city of Portsmouth, the Birthplace of Australia, on this historic occasion.

Peter G Christian President 13th May 1987."

Some 70 or so members of the Fellowship participated in proceedings connected with the launching of Australia Post's commemorative set of stamps in Martin Place on 13th May last. A similar ceremony was held in Canberra. Media cover was quite extensive, and a number of members autographed the First Day Covers. A framed set of stamps was presented to the Fellowship by the Premier of NSW, The Hon. Barrie Unsworth. The dinner that evening, at the Argyle Centre, was well attended and we thank member Sally Kalinas, for providing musical entertainment. Our Family Picnic Day the following Sunday was not so well attended due to cold threatening weather, but those who braved the day, enjoyed good fellowship. Congratulations to the Tuzo descendants for their display.

Permission has been granted by the relevant authorities to attach commemorative plaques in honour of our First Fleet ancestors, on both the Town Hall and Central Railway Station sites. Both are on sites of early cemeteries where a number of 1788 arrivals were originally buried (some may still be there). A ceremony of unveiling and dedication will be held, on a date to be announced, in 1988.

The Annual General Meeting will be held this year on the last Sunday in September at the Central Coast Leagues Club at Gosford. The Newcastle site was not suitable to the Executive, and it was felt that Gosford was a good compromise. The meeting will commence at 11 a.m. and Morning Tea will be provided at about 10 a.m. Members may either use the services of the club for lunch or have a picnic lunch in the park adjacent to the Club.

The Executive at its June meeting gave the imprimatur of the Fellowship to the proposed Bicentennial Sauare offered to the city by the developers of Grosvenor Place, on the corner of Grosvenor Stand Gaurae St.

One of the features of this square will be a Memorial Wall inscribed with the names of all known First Fleeters. The site, itself, is an historic one, being part of the original Parade Ground of the colony. Unfortunately, the National Trust is vehemently opposed to the demolition of some Edwardian buildings on the site and questions the motives of the developers. I feel sure that all members would be behind this concept of a Bicentennial Square and a fitting memorial to the first settlers . . . let us hope it comes to fruition.

The President represented the Fellowship at the following recent functions . . . The launching of Alan Frost's book on Governor Arthur Phillip at Admiralty House, the foundation ceremony of Darling Harbour Maritime Museum, by the Prime Minister, the Frederick Meredith Family Re-union and the Mobbs Muster.

LETTERS FROM PORTSMOUTH . . .

Joyce Cowell, Alice Clarke and Lloyd Allchin, members of the Executive, have all written of their experiences in Portsmouth during the First Fleet Re-Enactment celebrations in May.

Joyce writes in the following vein . . .

"Dear Peter and Members of the F.F.F., May 13th 1987.

This is THE great day! Our ancestors left here 200 years ago and I hope it was a fine, sunny day as it is now. I can see the ships anchored at MotherBank from my hotel window at Ryde, on the Isle of Wight. But let me relate what has happened so far . . .

SUNDAY May 10th — Alice, her sister, Ula, Lloyd and Mary Allchin and I, attended a service at St. Anne's Naval Chapel. It is a beautiful chapel, and, as there had been a wedding the previous day, the floral decorations were really lovely. The Liaison Plaques were placed on a cushion on the chapel altar. At the commencement of the service the Chaplain, The Rev. Bucks, asked me to make a little speech, outlining the origin and purpose of the Commemorative Plaques. They were dedicated during the service. Alice Clarke read one of the Lessons and Lloyd Allchin and Ula Clarke took up the collection.

MONDAY May 11th — There was a Press Conference held on the wharf where the ships were docked. Many dignitaries from the naval establishment were present, in addition to the Captains and the crews of the Fleet ships plus Jonathan King, The Lord Mayor of Portsmouth and other V.I.Ps. The first of many presentations were the Liaison Plaques. A short speech by myself, then the presenting of the Tenerife Plaque to Commodore Kichenside, then a few words by Lloyd and the presentation of the Rio Plaque, and finally remarks by Alice and the handing over of the Capetown Plaque. All of this was photographed and televised, and we believe some of it was shown on Channel 9 news in Sydney. At the conclusion of this ceremony, I packaged the Plaques together and they were duly taken on board the Bounty. We all had invitations to a Mayoral Reception that evening, but unfortunately I had to give that a miss due to the difficulty in transport from the Isle of Wight, to the mainland and back, in the evenings.

TUESDAY MAY 12th — Less official things today . . . The fleet left Portsmouth and I was able to see its arrival at the MotherBank from here in Ryde. It was a wonderful sight.

WEDNESDAY MAY 13th - There were so many functions that we had more invitations than we could accept. Those staying in Portsmouth, itself, were able to attend a morning function at which the Queen witnessed some Aboriginal dances in the City square, the Sydney Bi-Centennial Band played and Her Majesty unveiled a plaque to commemorate this historic event. Meantime, on the Isle of Wight, there was a colourful procession of 100 Town Criers from all over the world . . . the streets were decorated with flags and there were displays in shop windows. The Queen opened the Genealogical Research unit at St. Thomas' Church, Ryde in the afternoon. The Fellowship had sent quite a bit of detail on the First Fleeters some time previously to the Director, Mr Ian Lauder. We were seated quite close to the dais. A replica of the anchor from the Sirius was unveiled and also a presentation of paintings to the Australian people was made.

One of which, was the Fleet anchored on the MotherBank, and the Other, of the fleet in Sydney Harbour. The Queen spoke about the First Fleet in her speech. Here comes my great moment!!! I was the lucky one to receive an invitation from the Lord Chamberlain to be present at a reception given by the Queen at Osborne House, one of Queen Victoria's homes and the place where she died in 1901. The guests, including myself, were driven by coaches from St Thomas' to Osborne House and I felt like Royalty, myself, with people lining the barriers, cheering and waving as we drove through the streets closed to traffic. In the ornate Durbar Room of Osborne House, the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh mingled with their guests. Being the only "ordinary" Australian there, (there were some Australian officials in attendance) was duly presented. Yes! I made my curtsey, the Queen shook my hand, and asked a few questions about my Australian ancestors. It was a most exciting moment for me, personally. A light meal was served at Osborne House before returning to the hotel to catch one's breath for the final event . . . a fireworks display on the Ryde waterfront. I have just returned from that to finish this letter to all my friends in the F.F.F. A truly memorable 13th May."

"Dear Peter . . .

As you have probably heard, our visit to Portsmouth was a great success and it was of enormous benefit to

have had the official blessing of the Fellowship. On the other hand, I am sure we were all good ambassadors and our presence seemed to be a worth while addition to the celebrations. Joyce was marvellous in all of her appearances and spoke so well at the Church service and Press Conference. Also, I believe Alice and her sister, Ula, acquitted themselves extremely well when they had the opportunity to be interviewed by the BBC. Between us, we attended all major functions, most in privileged positions and by special invitation only. These included the Lord Mayor's Bi-Centennial First Fleet Dinner, the unveiling of the plaque by Her Majesty, The Queen in the square on the waterfront at SallyPort, the Memorial Service in St. Anne's Naval Chapel, the Shipside Press Conference, the Isle of Wight celebrations and the later, more select gathering at Osborne House. In addition, many of us enjoyed the sight of the Re-Enactment ships moving in line from Portsmouth Harbour on the 12th May, some with sails set.

For me, the Lord Mayor's Formal Dinner, on the evening of the 11th May, was particularly enjoyable. As a final celebration we were treated to a very nice Buffet meal at Southsea Castle before the fireworks on the night of the 13th May."

Alice Clarke also sent a card saying what a wonderful experience it had been and that they had been included in all ceremonies and given V.I.P. treatment.

NORFOLK ISLAND VISIT

The tourist agency has informed us that due to the large influx of visitors to Norfolk Island next year for the Re-Enactment ceremony, numbers at that ceremony will have to be limited, but we, as a group, have been offered full places. It will mean, however, an extra charge of \$20.00, but due to the fact that we have been granted a concession, it only means an added charge of about \$7.50. This pays for transport from our respective hotels to Emily Beach, a picnic lunch and entree to all other activities being held there

A number of members have enquired about departure and arrival times. We leave Sydney Airport at 11.20 a.m. and arrive back a week later at 5.20 p.m. We would also assure those who have stipulated either the Saturday or Friday departure, that your request has been acknowledged. Those leaving on FRIDAY will be staying at the Polynesian and/or Hillcrest Motels, and those leaving SATURDAY will be accommodated at the Norfolk Island Hotel. As soon as we receive the itinerary, we will advise those who have booked, by post. All monies have to be paid by the last week of November as the tourist agency requires full payment by mid December. The lucky draw for the concession plane tickets will take place at the Fellowship rooms on Wednesday July 13th, the day of the Auxiliary meeting. The lucky two who will win a free flight will be notified immediately if they are not at the meeting. Please remember . . . you require a valid passport or travel permit to proceed to Norfolk Island, also there is a tourist departure fee on Norfolk of \$10.00, and luggage is limited to one medium size case plus personal hand luggage.

We think that that is all for now . . . Good Luck for the draw in July.

The following letter is from member David Martin, Rear Admiral R.A.N. . . . F.F. Johnston/Abrahams

"One of the exciting suggestions that has been put forward for the Bicentennial Year is to have a ceremony at which the people of Australia could be made aware of the achievements of some descendants of the First Fleet. Jonathan King has already contacted a few people in the public eye and some have already agreed to be involved. The original idea was for a landing of eleven notable descendants on the 26th January, but this does not fit in with the plans of the Australian 8icentennial Authority because the 26th is too busy, and the idea of an actual landing is not popular. However it should be possible to arrange a significant occasion on another date. Some of the names that Jonathan King suggested were the:

Hon. Paul Everingham, MP (Former Chief Minister NT and now a Federal Member); Dr Graham Clarke (Surgeon at the Eye and Ear Hospital, Melbourne, and Inventor of Bionic Ear for the Deaf); Helen Reddy (famous singer); Captain Paul Kable, RAN; Rev. John MacKnight (Rector of the Kings Cross City Mission); Dr. Jonathan King (Historian, Author, Lecturer, First Fleet Re-enactment); James Fairfax (Chairman, John Fairfax & Sons); Georgina Parkes (Swimmer at the Olympic & Commonwealth Games); Mark Edmondson (tennis champion); Pat Lovell (Film Producer —Picnic at Hanging Rock, Gallipoli); Oswald Brett (successful artist in New York); Thea Rowe, MBE (actress); Robert Walden (Gold Medal Winner at the Games for the Handicapped); Richard Bonynge (composer and conductor); Peter Christian (President, Fellowship of First Fleeters).

That is a pretty impressive list to start with, but it would be interesting to know how many more descendants of First Fleeters there are with some particular achievement to their credit — please think about it and make suggestions to the President or the Editor."
