



Small Family Association

he John and Mary Small Descendants Association will be having its twenty-seventh anniversary thanksgiving service on Sunday, 12 October 1997, at historic St Anne's Anglican Church, Ryde.

The association is delighted that this day is the actual 209th anniversary of its First Fleeters' wedding at Port Jackson conducted by Chaplain Richard Johnson on 12 October 1788. The marriage was probably under a tree and it was later registered at St Phillip's, Sydney. The records show that the marriage had the approval of Governor Arthur Phillip.

John and Mary Small settled in the Ryde area and played a prominent part in the establishment of St Anne's Church. They had seven children and most of them and their spouses are buried in St Anne's Cemetery including John Small himself.



The memorabilia is a collection of family trees and photos of ancestors professionally put together from originals supplied by descendants. Copies will be available for sale together with the family books, 'The Small Family in Australia 1788-1988' and 'The Updated Information 1995.'

The thanksgiving service will be held in historic St Anne's Church commencing at 2.30pm. This service will be followed by a dedication service at the restored memorial to Miriam Small and five of her fourteen children who died in infancy. Miriam (Bragg) Small married John and Mary Small's grandson Thomas in 1852 at St Anne's Church and died on 29 April 1874 just hours after giving birth to their fourteenth child, Walter Andrew. The Small Family Association accepted an invitation to contribute to the restoration of Miriam Small's memorial tombstone. The names of her children who died in infancy are also inscribed on the tombstone. At the family reunion held in 1996 those gathered donated altogether about \$250 for the project. This year the tombstone will be dedicated by the Rector of St Anne's.

The Small Family Association is still seeking family update information from descendants on birth dates of new additions and date of death of departed relatives.

Where First Fleeters lie

n 1976 a project to find burial sites of First Fleeters who arrived with Captain Arthur Phillip in 1788 was commenced. Since then, eighty-seven memorial plaques have been attached to tombstones of First Fleeters, identifying the interred as First Fleeters.

Although investigations have shown records stating that First Fleeters are buried in specific cemeteries, because no tombstone and no specific record of the actual location of the burial site has been found, we are not able to install a memorial plaque for these people.

A number of family associations have had memorials installed at the cemetery in memory of their First Fleet ancestor and we have been able to install a memorial plaque on the monument.

Often, further investigation has revealed inscribed tombstones for children of First Fleeters buried in the cemetery where the First Fleeter was subsequently buried without an inscribed tombstone. There is the possibility that the First Fleeter may have been buried in the same site as the children without another inscription.

We are seeking your support by letting us know if your First Fleeter may be buried under the circumstances that have been mentioned. If so, it may be that the situation can be investigated for the possible installation of a memorial plaque for your famous ancestor.






Tuesday morning began with a trip to Jinchilla Gallery and Gardens, where they exhibit and sell paintings, pottery and handicrafts. We then travelled to the local observatory, and here the original owner and builder delivered a very interesting and informative talk on the workings of the telescope, as well as the numerous planets that could be viewed. Unfortunately, the sky was overcast and we were not able to use the telescope. Following this, we continued through Warrumbungles National

Park to The Sidings Observatory, the largest observatory in Australia. Once again, cloudy skies and fog prevented us seeing the Warrumbungle mountains and the view from the observatory.

First up Wednesday morning was a visit to the Angora Farm, where large rabbits are bred for their fur. Here we were able to see a demonstration of a rabbit being shorn. This farm, which is also a zoo, includes many local and international animals. From here we travelled on a local launch down the Macquarie River, at the same

time enjoying a prepared lunch. The afternoon included a bus tour along the Newell Highway to see the cotton fields.





Letters to the Editor

EDWARD WHITTON (1751-1802)

im Mayson, a descendant of Edward Whitton, has been researching his family tree, and has come up with a good suggestion. He would like to see the introduction of a letters section within this newsletter through which various family members could seek and exchange information from other family members who share a mutual interest in developing their family tree. He has supplied us with information he has on the life and history of Edward Whitton and any member wishing to contact him may do so by writing to him at 8 Karema Crescent, Runaway Bay Qld 4216.

This idea is not restricted to the Edward Whitton family

descendants as other members of the Fellowship may choose to seek family tree details by this method. Sometimes it is difficult to obtain family tree information from close or distant relatives and it is in these cases where the Fellowship may be able to help.

The Fellowship is creating family history charts from information supplied by members as well as that taken from books and manuscripts on Australian history both bought and donated to the Fellowship. This information is available for all members to view in the Library at Fellowship House during the week.

In his letter suggesting this approach, Jim has provided some useful information on the Edward Whitton family and writes as follows:

"Similar to many other members of the Fellowship and those interested in their Australian family heritage, I

have traced many of the family trees down from our First Fleeter and his spouse and where I once thought I had a very limited number of relatives/cousins, I now know that I am related to thousands, one way or another. A most enjoyable and rewarding experience.

"I am descended from Edward Whitton (Scarborough – First Fleet 1788) and Ann Slater (Queen – Third Fleet 1791). Their daughter Mary Whitton married Richard Barnes (Glatton – 1803) at St Matthew's, Windsor in 1811 and had seven children. I am through their youngest and seventh child Richard, who was born at Lower Minto in 1825. Richard Barnes senior died in 1826. Mary Barnes then married John Eccleston (Lord Sidmouth – 1819) at St Peters, Campbelltown in 1827 and they in turn also had seven children. What a woman! All the descendants of Edward and Ann are through Mary Whitton and her Barnes and Eccleston family. All very early history.

"It is known that Edward had died shortly before July 1802 when Ann sought approval and became the executrix of the estate of Edward, which consisted primarily of "Whitton Farm", being a 1794 grant of land of 30 acres on the river at Mulgrave Place and directly opposite what is now the bridge at Windsor. Ann had the custody of their two children – Mary 1796-7 and William 1799 – and, with the assistance of two other females they continued to operate the farm for a short period. The problem of survival must have been immense and she married John Norman in August 1803. Records show that John Norman married again in 1807 and operated the Watkins Farm. This was probably a recorded error as it was most likely the Whitton Farm. Ann probably died c1805-6 but I have not been able to find any records whatsoever.

"The Sydney Gazette however reported in September 1810

that a child in the Orphan Asylum whose name was Mary Whitton had a broken leg from an accidental fall and now lies dangerously ill. I have not located any records of the inmates or location of that Orphan Asylum but we know that Mary Whitton married Richard Barnes in 1811.

"Unfortunately I have not been able to trace any record of the dates and place of the deaths of Edward and Ann nor where they were buried. Very little is known of their work places from their dates of arrival until 1794.

"It is hoped that this letter will be the catalyst to establish a "Mail Box" as part of the Newsletter and that also members and family descendants of Edward and Ann arrange to form a small working party in the Sydney area and by every means possible, try to determine the dates and places of the last resting place of our Edward and Ann. Also to arrange for the

funding and erection of a long-lasting memorial, possibly in the Windsor area, in remembrance of our first Australians as has been done for many other First Fleeters.

"I have endeavoured to set down some guidelines for this task in the letter which accompanied this proposal, and I have also suggested that the letter be included in the FFF Newsletter.

"It is essential that for this "Mail Box" to succeed, the working party must have active support and input from the descendants of Edward and Ann, and in doing so that we will locate these missing records. Best of luck.
